MISSION STATEMENT

The Canterbury Episcopal School inspires in each student a love of learning, in preparation for college, with an emphasis on academic excellence, spiritual development, appreciation of diversity, and social responsibility.

COMMUNITY AND SCHOOL

The Canterbury Episcopal School was founded in 1992 with twelve students in Kindergarten. Over the course of 18 years, Canterbury has added a new grade-level each year. Our first senior class graduated in 2004. Current enrollment (Grades K-12) is 240 students. Upper School (Grades 9-12) enrollment is 65 students.

The Canterbury Episcopal School is recognized by Southwest Association of Episcopal Schools for its commitment to diversity. Approximately 40% of Canterbury's population consists of students of color.

The Canterbury Episcopal School provides a challenging education in the humanities, arts, social sciences, and natural sciences for students in Kindergarten through Grade 12. A talented faculty encourages Canterbury students to explore and examine a recognized body of scholarship that prepares individuals for life as informed citizens. The educational experience is structured to develop a mastery of subject matter as well as a life-long love of learning. Underlying this mission is the intention to nurture both the mind and spirit of each student. Accordingly, the Canterbury Upper School experience includes the development of moral reasoning and an awareness of values and viewpoints beyond the self.

The Upper School at Canterbury is committed to providing students with a superior college preparatory experience; 100% of Canterbury graduates attend two- or four-year institutions of higher learning. Grounded by a tradition of moral development and social responsibility, Canterbury instills in each student the habits of scholarship and empathy necessary for life as an intelligent, compassionate, and discerning individual.

Canterbury's Episcopal identity anchors the School's values of spiritual development, appreciation of diversity, and social responsibility. Students participate in Chapel where an exploration of faith, ethics, and diversity are presented through liturgy. Students also consider life and all of its dilemmas in contemporary society through participation in a multi-grade level advisory system and community service projects.

The Canterbury Episcopal School is accredited by Southwestern Association of Episcopal Schools (SAES) and is affiliated with the National Association of Independent Schools (NAIS).
