The dream for Rick Stover has finally become reality.

After years of youth, high school and a year of junior college baseball, the former Midlothian catcher received what he always wanted - a scholarship offer to play next season for Oklahoma State. As a lifelong Cowboy fan, Stover's excitement over the move to Stillwater is evident.

"It feels great. It's going to be like a homecoming when I get down there," Stover said.

A two-time district defensive player of the year in high school, Stover is currently at

Howard Junior College where he posted a strong freshman season. He caught 27 games, making just two errors for the whole season. On offense, Stover notched 30 hits (six doubles, two triples and four homers) in 76 at-bats for a .395 batting average.

The strong start to his college career is something he attributes to years of hard work and continued work in college. Stover estimates he spends four to five hours a day on the field with another

hour or more in the weight room. All that has combined for a freshman season even he didn't see coming.

"It went great, better than planned. I hit a lot better than I expected to and my defense just rose to the next level being out here with the coaches we have," Stover said.

Obviously, Oklahoma State took notice as well offering Stover a sizable scholarship to come spend his final two collegiate years wearing the orange and black.

While the ultimate goal of earning a scholarship is a great feeling, Stover acknowledges he has unfinished business with Howard as the team seeks to win another national championship. After winning the title the season before Stover's arrival, the Midlothian alum wants to leave the program with a championship of his own.

"Winning the national championship - we've got a great team this year and we're going to make a run for it. It's just going to be a lot of fun," Stover said.
